Western Heritage (3 courses)	
The Western Heritage courses are primarily history courses enriched by a study of the art, music, literature, and philosophy of the corresponding time periods. You must take 4 courses to earn credit for all three (History 4A, 4B and 4C as well as one other from either HUM111 or HUM 212/313; or HUMN 1A and HUMN1B and one other course from both HUM111 and HUM 212/213). The Western Heritage sequence credits are awarded on an all or none basis; no partial credit will be given. Please note that credit for HUM 313 will show as "Satisfied Course" as it is an upper division course that cannot be fulfilled by one that is lower division.
