The Liberal Arts major is a diverse multiple-subject program organized around a cohesive academic plan. Designed to prepare students academically, socially, and culturally, graduates are involved in local, national, and international arenas. The major facilitates a well-rounded knowledge base by drawing from seven major academic disciplines. The






program allows students to specialize their education by concentrating in one of these areas while also gaining perspective on the other six educational spheres.

The Liberal Arts major has two emphases: Subject & Teaching


The **teaching** emphasis is designed to provide students with the breadth of content knowledge needed for multiple subject teaching and prepares students to pass the California Subject Examination for Teachers. Because it is primarily designed for students seeking a multiple subject teaching credential, three interdisciplinary professional education courses are included in the major. The full sequence of professional education course requirements can be taken as electives and completed for the SB 2042 Preliminary Multiple Subject Teaching Credential.

The **subject** emphasis provides a broad-based academic degree with course selection options other than those required for a teaching credential. Students can take the required credential classes as a selection, but are not required to do so.



The major consists of a minimum of 37 units beyond the general education requirements.

The **core program** of classes is designed to give a comprehensive background evenly distributed among all disciplines: fine arts; language; religion, philosophy and culture; history; English composition and literature; social science; human development; mathematics; and natural science.



Students also choose one 12-unit **concentration:**

FINE ARTS (art, music, or theatre emphasis)

HUMAN DEVELOPMENT (family studies, psychology, or sociology emphasis)

LANGUAGE (Spanish, literature, or writing & rhetoric emphasis)

SOCIAL SCIENCE (history or social science emphasis)

SPORTS MEDICINE/PE
